MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

It seems that this last fiscal year passed in a blur! This is actually a good thing as it means nothing untoward occurred in that time, and everything was operating as it should. If there were any bumps that occurred, they were handled competently and efficiently.

Exhibitions are being presented, workshops are being attended, and craft shows are teeming with vendors and eager buyers. Overall visitor attendance is up along with a growing membership. The MCC is sustaining its provincial mandate by currently touring a selection of work from its 2023 Members' show, Craft in Colour, to rural venues and art centres.

Our collaboration with the Manitoba Crafts Museum and Library has been nothing but beneficial to both organizations, and we are pleased to engage with them in presenting the benefits of the C2 space to all people who enjoy the many aspects of Craft.

While there are always vagaries in funding - the pool of available sources is constantly shrinking - a positive note occurred when the incoming Government increased the funding to the Manitoba Arts Council who then increased our funding slightly. We are always on the search for more accessible and, especially, sustainable funding, and we are pleased that our own endowment fund will soon be paying dividends along with the Robert and Meridel Archambeau fund.

Our members are continuing to have success both locally and abroad, notably Métis beadworker, Jeninne Krauchi, who received both the Manitoba Arts Award of Distinction and the Winnipeg Arts Council Making a Difference Award.

Of course, none of this good stuff happens without the hard work and dedication of the board, the volunteers, and especially the staff of the Manitoba Craft Council.

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

The 2023-2024 year was another full and exciting one for the Manitoba Craft Council. As always, exhibitions are at the heart of MCC's work. This year's line-up included Do you whisper a tiny I'm sorry?, a show featuring hand-tufted rugs, photography and poetry reflecting on the vulnerability and beauty of birds and the humans who love them by BC artist Anne Steeves; Remold, a group exhibition curated by Shaneela Boodoo featuring a dozen MCC members whose work connects with the body; and _at the end of a line, a circle., a material examination of the value of labour and materials by Winnipeg artist Kristin Nelson. Colour catalogues and programming were produced to enhance each of these beautiful shows.

Through our hands-on CraftEd workshops, Craft and Craft Beer nights, artist talks and Instagram Live interviews with artists, we provided meaningful and fun learning opportunities for all. MCC was also pleased to collaborate with the MB Bookbinders Collective, Pembina Fibreshed, and local artists to offer workshops and space for group meetings. An inaugural spring 2024 gathering with the leadership teams of ten local craft-related guilds and organizations was an excellent opportunity to consult with other stakeholders, share information, and offer support to the craft sector.

Community engagement was a strong focus again in 2023-2024 with several on-going programmes including the Warm Hands, Warm Hearts workshops in collaboration with community groups like 1JustCity which saw volunteers transforming old fur and leather coats into warm mittens for use by those experiencing homelessness; a sale of beaded jewellery by Women Helping Women Beadwork Collective, a programme supporting Indigenous women who are incarcerated or recently released; and a collaboration with MOSAIC Newcomer Family Resource Centre offering Métis Beading workshops and teachings to newcomers as part of their regular EAL classes.

In partnership with the Winnipeg Art Gallery, Northwest Territories Arts and the Government of Nunavut, MCC hosted the 9th annual Crafted Sale, Fashion Show, and Lookbook in November 2023, a multi-day event featuring work by 100 craftspeople and 25 run-way designers. MCC's also partnered again with IKEA Winnipeg to produce a unique three-day Vinterfest sale, expanding it to include 40 craft artists this year.

MCC's fundraising efforts have continued to grow while also serving an important role of meeting our organizational mandate to support, promote and advocate for craft and craftspeople. The Changing Hands "De-Stash" sale, MCC's annual craft social, and the Reaching Out raffle have become well-oiled machines that generate critical income for the organization. MCC was also honoured to partner with the friends of Robert Archambeau to host a memorial event/sale of his work with proceeds funding an endowment award. On the governance side, following two years of training and reflection around equity, diversity and inclusion, MCC's board launched a full policy review and development project with an external consultant.

Undoubtedly the biggest highlight of the year was celebrating the legacy of Métis beadworker Jennine Krauchi who won both the Winnipeg Arts Council's Making a Difference Award and the Manitoba Arts Award of Distinction, this province's biggest arts prize. MCC was honoured to nominate Jennine for these prestigious and much deserved awards in partnership with MAWA and MCML.

Looking back on the year, I feel tremendous gratitude for our amazing staff, board and volunteers. Together with our wonderful members, we're creating a thriving craft ecosystem that supports us all.

January - February 2024: Remold

We adorn and surround ourselves with craft through our homes and wardrobes. These intuitive choices come from somewhere, and are trying to communicate something. Craft is a way we can express our desires to conform to, or rebel against, societal pressures and conventions. The complex nuances of identity weave together through making, giving space to imagine new ways of being, free from the conventions of the dominant culture. Remold sought to explore the infinite possibilities of how we make ourselves.

September-October 2023: Do You Whisper a Tiny I'm Sorry by Anne Steves

Welsh-Canadian artist Anne Steves invited us to reflect on the universal and intimate dilemmas of life, loss, and connection through her exhibition Do you whisper a tiny "I'm sorry?" Featuring tufted wool rugs, photographs, and her own written reflections, she transformed images of lifeless birds into large, human-scale artworks. Her work invited gallery visitors to join her in interacting with these tactile proxies, absorbing the words and images presented, and sitting with the feelings and thoughts that emerge.

EXHIBITIONS

May - June 2024: _at the end of a line, a circle. by Kristin Nelson

In her exhibition, Nelson used traditional craft processes like knitting and net-making paired with non-traditional materials to playfully subvert a range of established binaries. The lines we draw between what is deemed useful or dysfunctional, amateur or professional, valuable or disposable, public or private are no match for her gentle wit and wise hands.

Her work questions what would happen if we treated every person's labour as equally valuable and every material as precious. In a world where anything can be art, what if we treated everything like art?



Summer 2024: Up and Coming Craft is an annual digital show for youth, students, and recent graduates of a post-secondary program who are working in a craft-based medium or using craft techniques. Participating artists this past year included: Etel Shevelev, Ela Wasney, Madeleine Carlson, Brody McQueen, Tanadebabari Shalom Boogbaa Lebe, Raymond Lyttle, Cooper Vint, and Aylin Kohan.

Most of the above also included a virtual tour, video release and/or Instagram video chats with the artists by way of engaging the audience.

- Anne Steeves had an artist talk in association with her exhibition, Do You Whisper a Tiny I'm Sorry?
- Craftivism: Adriana Alarcón shared stories from her own practice, as well as those of other contemporary craftivists and their communities, providing a lived definition of the term, and offering examples of exhibitions which have highlighted this practice.
- The Weapons We Become: PJ Anderson discussed the changing role of the racialized potter through her ceramic works.
- The MCC hosted a roundtable gathering of leaders from craft organizations, guilds, and associations from across Manitoba. This roundtable provided a space for leaders of craft-based organizations to share information, ideas, and challenges with like-minded organizers, build professional connections, and work with the Manitoba Craft Council to strengthen the craft eco-system in this province.

- The flagship Crafted Sale and Crafted Fashion Show returned to WAG-Qaumajuq in November 2023.
- The MCC-IKEA Vinterfest Market was back for a second year with 40 participating artists in December 2023.
- C2 hosted Women Helping Women Beadwork Collective for a Trunk Sale in December 2023 which saw over 100 visitors shop beadwork made by incarcerated women in Manitoba, with 100% of the profits going to the makers.

FUNDRAISING REPORT

It's nice when all the news is good news! That's definitely the situation for the MCC Fundraising Committee this year. Most importantly, we have settled on a three-event format that we'll be able to build on in the coming years.

In partnership with MCML, we revived the destash sale - Changing Hands - in a more targeted format: a one-day sale of donated craft supplies and tools. And the donations! They astonished us all -- we were able to distribute a spectacular array of tools and materials into the craft community, and, in the process, exceeded our expected revenue.

The Reaching Out Raffle returned, running from September through December, with the Early Bird draw after CRAFTED and the main draws after IKEA Vinterfest. The quality of the prizes drove excellent ticket sales, so our sincerest thanks go to Axe Throwing Winnipeg, Beads by Nichol, the Blue Bombers, the Canadian Fossil Discovery Centre, Folklorama, Magpie Chiq, MTYP, the Manitoba Museum, Keith Oliver, PTE, RMTC, Valour FC, WAG-Qaumajuq and the WSO. Custom tea towels and tote bags were also sold during those events.

Finally, the social event in honour of C2's 8th anniversary celebrated Linen & Lace with demonstrations of flax processing, lace-making, themed food and drink, live music, a silent auction and a 50/50 draw. Special thanks to musician Ingrid Aubrey, the Prairie Fibreshed, Jocelyn Froese, Buvette in the Village, and all of the donors to our silent auction!

We were also extremely grateful to the donations received outside these events. Fundraising and donations raised a total of \$24,569 this year! Our gratitude goes out to everyone who participated as a donor, a purchaser or a volunteer --- our fundraising efforts would come to nothing without you!






