Period: Late 19th Century

Description: Oblong basket with slightly flared sides and rounded shoulder. It is rigid, constructed on a bundle foundation of cedar root splints. It is made up of a continuous coil that is sewn with peeled, split cedar root, with bifurcated, interlocking stitches. Four wrapped loops protrude from shoulder, two per side. Two high, rigid, curved, moveable handles attached through loops on basket wall. The handles and loops are wrapped with root, probably over a bundle foundation. Flat, oblong lid fits snugly on to basket and includes a curved handle attached to the centre of the lid. It has the same construction as the basket, with a triangle motif imbricated in natural and dyed cherry bark around mid-section of basket and around top of lid and a single row of imbrication in natural cherry bark encircles the shoulder of basket above the loops. The reddish brown coloured cherry bark is natural, while the black coloured cherry bark is dyed.

<u>Description</u>: Oval-shaped, rigid basket with a slat foundation of cedar wood. The parallel foundation elements are sewn with peeled, split cedar root. They have bifurcated, interlocking stitches. There is a checker motif beaded around basket wall using natural reddish brown and dyed black cherry bark strips in two rows. The rim is finished with type of plait stitching using cedar root; footed base.

<u>Description:</u> Woven grass container. Container is circular and has two rows of a geometric design around the circumference in beige-coloured grass. Interior has bands of red dye.

Description: Round and open basket with straight sides. It has a slat foundation of cedar wood, with the parallel foundation elements sewn together with peeled, split cedar root in bifurcated, interlocking stitches. There is a zigzag motif imbricated around basket, made up of cherry bark strips and grass. The reddish brown bark and grass are natural, with the dark brown bark is likely dyed. The grass has been pounded to flatten it. The decorative rim is finished with loosely twisted loops, constructed on a bundle foundation wrapped with split root and attached at intervals with two stitches along the top edge of the basket.

Serving Tray

Object name: Serving Tray

Period: Late 19th Century

Description: Elliptical-shaped tray with squared ends and a slat foundation of cedar wood. The parallel foundation elements are sewn with peeled, split cedar root, with bifurcated, interlocking stitches. There is a zigzag and diamond motif beaded on the inside of the tray using natural reddish brown and dyed black cherry bark strips. There are also alternating rectangular blocks woven in same cherry bark around exterior basket walls. A row of natural and black cherry bark encircles perimeter of exterior base. The rim is finished with type of plait stitching using cedar root.

<u>Description:</u> Small, oval basket with flat lid; base started with plaited cedar bark strips; 2 rows of twined cedar bark encircle plaited rectangular centre; base is finished with strands of sedge or grass in wrapped twining around the cedar bark weft; basket walls are twined grass with cedar bark warp; decorative motif on basket and lid executed in brightly dyed grass on natural background; double row of blue dyed grass encircles bottom of basket walls with 4 large fish in pink, green-blue, red and purple around the mid-section; lid is decorated with 2 boats and whalers, 8 sea birds and 2 whales.
