<u>Description:</u> White leather pointed-toe style moccasins trimmed with rabbit fur and lined with pink cotton inside. The vamps and sides at the heel are adorned with embroidered floral motifs that evocate the Norway House embroidery style. The three rings of cord border the floral on the vamps.

Left hand mitten has 2 blue ribbons attached to cuffs. Right hand mitten has 2 blue ribbons and 2 purple ribbons attached to cuffs. Spot of overlay stitch technique.

<u>Narrative</u>: Silk ribbon applique is common among northern Athapaskan, Dene and Métis work. Possibly Northern Métis.

Description: Caribou hide, with a silk floral embroidered design on one pocket, both cuffs, back shoulder area and wide front panels. The flowers in the designs are several shades of pink, purple, grey, blue and yellow, with green leaves and stems. The front panel covers three brass button closures (bottom button is missing). The panel is attached to jacket with hooks. There are two brass buttons on exterior of jacket for decoration, with the top button missing. Brass buns have an anchor on them. There is a leather fringe on shoulders, front and back. The leather edges are cut with in zigzags. The front panel and inside front lined in pink and blue and cream striped cotton. The designs are done in crewel-type embroidery.

The fingers and thumb have machine-stitched thread outlines and the backs have machine-stitched linear pattern on the cuff. The lining is done in blue fabric.

The shaft of the mukluks is trimmed with rabbit fur trim and has rabbit fur pompoms at the end of its drawstrings. The blanket cloth inner lining is adorned with embroidery at the rim.




